A Choral Reading/Speaking Script: The Origins of Arbor Day By Lois Walker

FORMATTING:

This script was written as a choral reading/speaking piece and is formatted for ALL, ALL GIRLS, ALL BOYS and lines for 1 SOLO READER reading the part of Julius Sterling Morton.

ESTABLISHING THE RHYTHM:

To find the proper rhythm, first read-aloud and clap through the piece as you go. Each underlined word or word part falls directly on a beat. As you read, clap on each underlined word, keeping the rhythm steady. Be careful not to read too fast! This is a rehearsal technique and readers will not clap throughout the entire piece during performance.

"The first Arbor Day took place on April 10, 1872 in Nebraska. It was the brainchild of Julius Sterling Morton (1832-1902), a Nebraska journalist and politician originally from Michigan. Throughout his long and productive career, Morton worked to improve agricultural techniques in his adopted state and throughout the United States when he served as President Grover Cleveland's Secretary of Agriculture. But his most important legacy is Arbor Day.

Morton felt that Nebraska's landscape and economy would benefit from the wide-scale planting of trees. He set an example himself planting orchards, shade trees and wind breaks on his own farm and he urged his neighbors to follow suit. Morton's real opportunity, though, arrived when he became a member of Nebraska's state board of agriculture. He proposed that a special day be set aside dedicated to tree planting and increasing awareness of the importance of trees. Nebraska's first Arbor Day was an amazing success."

ALL GIRLS: Is that the way it happened? Yes, that's what they say!

ALL BOYS: He <u>did</u>n't plant as<u>par</u>agus and <u>did</u>n't plant <u>hay</u>.

ALL: <u>Some</u> suggested <u>tur</u>nips, but he <u>said</u>...

SOLO: "No <u>Way!</u>

ALL: <u>Back</u> in Ne<u>bra</u>ska, eighteen <u>sev</u>enty <u>two</u>, (1872)

<u>Jul</u>ius Sterling <u>Mor</u>ton knew ex<u>act</u>ly what to <u>do</u>. He <u>plant</u>ed new <u>shade</u> trees – <u>tree</u>s ga<u>lore</u>!

SOLO: "More shade trees than I'd ever seen before."

ALL: <u>Some</u> suggested <u>cab</u>bage, but he <u>said</u>...
