Movement and Action

The following Teacher Script versions of "The Crazy Critters" and "The Fish Tank" include movement and action directions which may be used if preparing readers for a more formal, elaborate performance of the story. These directions appear <u>only</u> in the Teacher Scripts. Disregard directions, if you have chosen a simpler readers approach.

Color-Me Poster, Performance Program Cover, Theatre Ticket

Included with these scripts are black and white drawings which are meant to be colored by your students.

Duplicate the Color-Me Posters and ask each student to color them in any way he or she might like. The posters may also be used as publicity posters which can be posted around your school or library to publicize a reading performance of the story.

Program covers have been included to help you when planning a reading performance for an audience. Simply duplicate the program cover, copying as many as your audience will need. Fold duplicated sheets into program shape, and ask students to fill insides with the important details (cast list and reader names, synopsis of the story, director, etc.). Students may also color the front of each program. As audience members enter the room before the performance, ask student ushers to hand each a program.

If time allows, also duplicate the special theatre tickets and ask your students to color them. Cut out each ticket and make the tickets available to audience members a few days before the performance. Again, ask student ushers to collect the tickets as audience enters.



THE CRAZY CRITTERS

Teacher/Narrator enters, walks to large chair, faces audience, and says, "This looks like the right chair for me! I think I'll sit down and quietly read a crazy story while I wait."

CHILD 1 enters with folder open, pretending to read silently. CHILD 1 walks to proper chair, looks up and asks the teacher, "What are you doing Mr./Mrs. Teacher/Narrator looks up and says, "I'm reading a crazy story while I wait."

CHILDREN 2,3,4 enter with folders open, pretending to read silently. CHILDREN 2,3,4 walk to proper chairs, look up and ask, "What are you doing teacher?" Teacher/Narrator looks up and says, "We're reading crazy stories while we wait." CHILDREN 2,3,4 answer, "We will too!" They sit in proper chairs and also pretend to read silently.

CHILD 5 runs in with folder under arm and screeches to a halt just in front of proper chair. CHILD 5 says, "What are you all doing?" Teacher/Narrator and CHILDREN 1,2,3,4 look up and say in unison, "We're reading crazy stories while we wait!"

CHILD 5 says, "Who are you waiting for?" All answer, "YOU!"

CHILD 5 smiles at audience and sits. The reading begins.

THE CRAZY CRITTERS

camel:

n. a beast of burden with a humped back, found in Asia 4

llama:

n. a camel-like but humpless beast of burden having white or brownish thick woolly hair, found in South America

chimpanzee: n. an African ape having large ears and brown hair

giraffe:

n. the tallest of all animals, with a long neck and slender limbs, found in Africa

kangaroo:

n. an Australian marsupial with short, weak forelimbs and powerful hind

dinosaur:

n. family of extinct reptiles, including the largest known land animals

joey:

n. a young animal, especially a young kangaroo

THE CRAZY CRITTERS by Lois Walker

TEACHER SCRIPT

(PROPS OR COSTUME PIECES MAY BE USED AS EACH CHILD TAKES ROLE OF THE FUNNY OLD MAN. FOR EXAMPLE: STRANGE HAT, GLASSES WITH FALSE NOSE, AND WALKING CANE. AS READING BEGINS, PROPS AND COSTUMES ARE UNDER CHILD 1'S CHAIR. THESE ITEMS WILL BE PASSED FROM CHILD TO CHILD AS THE READING PROGRESSES.

LARGE SIGNS WITH THE FOLLOWING WORDS PRINTED UPON THEM WILL ALSO BE NEEDED: SURPRISED, AMAZED, DUMBFOUNDED, BEWILDERED, AND ASTONISHED. SIGNS MAY BE GLUED TO HOLDING STICKS, IF DESIRED. THESE WILL BE KEPT ON FLOOR IN FRONT OF APPROPRIATE READERS UNTIL CALLED FOR IN THE SCRIPT.)

Narrator: Late last Monday

It happened, you see,

Child 1: A funny old man

(CHILD 1 PUTS ON HAT AND GLASSES, TAKES CANE).

Child 2: Shuffled up to me.

Child 3: He pointed his finger

Child 4: And scratched his head.

(CHILD 1 STANDS AND SHUFFLES DOWNSTAGE CENTER, PRETENDING TO BE THE OLD MAN. CHILD 1 STANDS FACING AUDIENCE).

Child 5: Then this is what the old man said,

(THE FOLLOWING WORD MUST BE SAID JUST AS IT IS WRITTEN: "EX-CUE-OOOOZ" IS PRONOUNCED AS THREE SYLLABLES. "OOOOZ" AND "ME" ARE EMPHASIZED. REHEARSE THIS BY ESTABLISHING A BEAT OR RHYTHM WHICH WILL BE USED THROUGHOUT THE STORY WHEN THESE WORDS APPEAR).

All: "EX-CUE-OOOZ ME!

(CHILD 1 POINTS CANE OR WAGS FINGER AT AUDIENCE DURING FOLLOWING POEM. NOTE: DEPENDING ON CLASS READING LEVEL, CHILD 1 MAY <u>ACTUALLY READ</u> THE POEM INSTEAD OF NARRATOR).

Narrator: Is that your mama
With the thick woolly hair,
Looks like a camel
But her back is bare?

She's lost her hump! And I'll tell you, too, That crazy critter looks a lot

(ALL READERS POINT TO AUDIENCE IN UNISON ON "LIKE YOU!").

(CHILD 5 PICKS UP SIGN WHICH SAYS "SURPRISED." CHILD 5 STANDS, HOLDS SIGN ABOVE HEAD, AND SAYS):
